Forgiveness Sunday

This Sunday is called the Sunday of Forgiveness, in which we remember Adam and Eve being cast out of the Paradise of Eden. Though they initially wore no clothing, they were robed in garments of light and beauty. When cast out of Eden, they were clothed in skins of flesh, which signifies what is now our mortal, corruptible bodies.


Through transgressing the commandment of God by eating of the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil, Adam and Eve broke the divinely appointed fast. Now we, having inherited corrupted human nature and contributing our own sins to it, are called to keep a new divinely appointed fast: that of Great l ent.

As explained in the inspired writings from the Triodion, fasting is a spiritual tool that we utilize to purify our bodies and souls. Without fasting, true repentance and purification are nearly impossible. During Great Lent, we come together in oneness as the Body of Christ to fast, repent, and reflect upon our present condition.

This is a time of repentance and healing. That being the case, the fathers of the Church have deemed it proper that we also ask forgiveness from one another. Therefore, Forgiveness Lenten Vespers in celebrated on Sunday evening-the eve of Great Lent in which we seek each others forgiveness.

As our Lord and the fathers have taught us, it is not fitting to make an offering to God (our current offering being this upcoming Fast) if we harbor any sort of ill feelings in our heart toward one another. Our fasting will be rejected as hypocritical if we hold to any sort of malice. Fortunately, we are given the opportunity for repentance to both God and one another. In doing so, we receive the spiritual and emotional healing that is necessary for humility, peace of heart and mind, strength in fasting, and our salvation.

"Let us set out with joy upon the season of the Fast, and prepare ourselves for spiritual combat. Let us purify our soul and cleanse our flesh; and as we fast from food, let us abstain also from every passion. Rejoicing in the virtues of the Spirit may we persevere with love and so be counted worthy to see the solemn Passion of Christ our God, and with great spiritual gladness to behold His Holy Pascha."

Apolytikon for the Resurrection in Tone 8

From the heights Thou didst descend, O compassionate One, and Thou didst submit to the three-day burial, that Thou might deliver us from passion; Thou art our life and our Resurrection, O Lord, glory to Thee.

Apolytikion of the Church (Dormition) in Tone 1

In thy birth-giving, O Theotokos, thou didst keep and preserve virginity; and in thy falling-asleep thou hast not forsaken the world; for thou wast translated into life, being the Mother of Life. Wherefore, by thine intercessions, deliver our souls from death.

Kontakion for Forgiveness Sunday in Tone 6

O Thou Who guidest to wisdom, and givest understanding and intelligence, the Instructor of the ignorant, and Helper of the poor, strengthen my heart and grant it understanding, O Master. Give me word, O Word of the Father; for behold, I shall not refrain my lips from crying to Thee, O merciful One, have mercy upon me who am fallen.



During Great Lent the regular schedule of weekly services will include:

Great Compline - (Great) "Compline" means "at the end of the day," and is a service of Psalms, prayers and supplications that reflect on the day and asking God's guidance and blessing on the night ahead.

Presanctified Liturgy - Is the solemn Lenten Vespers and Prayers with Holy Communion. There is no consecration of the eucharistic gifts at the Presanctified Liturgy. Holy Communion is given from the eucharistic gifts sanctified during the Divine Liturgy of the previous Sunday.

Akathist Hymn - The "Akathist Hymn to the Mother of God" is so named because "the word '*akathistos*' or in Arabic 'Madayeh,' literally means 'not sitting,' i.e., standing; The hymns, poetic in nature, are an inspired means of expressing gratitude and praise to the Mother of God for what she has accomplished for our salvation."

In addition to the above services, **Saturday Great Vespers** and **Sunday Matins and Divine Liturgy** will be prayed.





THE EPISTLE AND GOSPEL READINGS

The Epistle (For Sunday of Forgiveness)

Verse: Make your vows unto the Lord and perform them. God is known in Judah; His name is great in Israel.

The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Romans. (13:11-14:4)

Brethren, now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand. Let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armor of light. Let us walk becomingly, as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in chambering and licentiousness, not in strife and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh to fulfill its lusts. But as for the one who is weak in faith, receive him, but not for disputes over opinions. For one believes he may eat anything; but the weak person eats herbs. Let not him who eats despise him who does not eat, and let not him who does not eat judge him who eats; for God has received him. Who are you to be the judge over the servant of a stranger? To his own master he either stands or falls; but he will be made to stand; for God is able to make him stand.

The Gospel (For Sunday of Forgiveness)

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew. (6:14-21)

The Lord said to His Disciples: If you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father also will forgive you; but if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses. And when you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by men but by your Father Who is in secret; and your Father Who sees in secret will reward you. Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

Beloved Hierarchs, Clergy, and Faithful of our Archdiocese,

Greetings in the name of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ!

During this holy season of repentance, we strive with renewed focus to live rightly, being "doers of the word and not just hearers" (James 1:22). Along with increasing our prayers and abandoning self-indulgence, we especially focus on caring for the needs of others. As we hear on Meatfare Sunday, we will be judged by God on how we have responded to the sufferings of the "least of these" (Matthew 25), so we must strive to give attention to their needs as we would to Christ's.

Although our Lord Jesus Christ taught and exemplified this law of love in the most perfect way, it is also beautifully stated in the Old Law, where God commands, "If one of your brothers happens to be in need..., you will not harden your heart nor shut your hand to your needy brother. You will surely open your hands to him" (Deuteronomy 15:7–8). Such giving is not just some humanitarian project but a relational act: opening our hearts and hands to our brothers and sisters.
